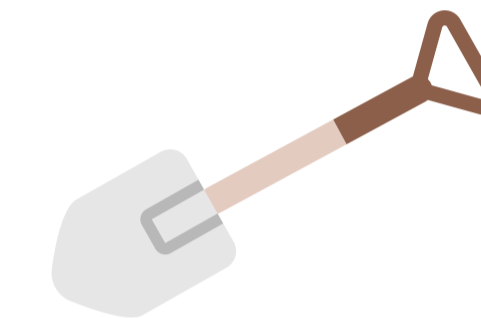

Capability Brown changed the face of the English countryside. His inspirational designs combined practicality and elegance, ensuring that his gardens provided everything that the great houses they served needed including beautiful surroundings which are still enjoyed by so many today.

Brown's work can be found across the country and many of England's listed properties have maintained his landscape designs some 300 years on.
